EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Earthquakes, fires and storms can cause unexpected challenges. Be prepared with these tips:

Practice Makes Prepared

- Conduct "Drop/Lock, Cover, and Hold On" for earthquake drills
- Create an emergency plan
- Know your evacuation route
- Sign up for emergency alerts
- · Make an emergency supply kit

What to include in emergency supply kit

- o Basic first aid kit
- o 7-10 gallons of water per person
- o 7-10 days' worth of food and medications
- Extra food, water and supplies for pets
- Flashlights and extra batteries
- Sanitation and hygiene supplies

PROJECT UPDATES

Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts work to continually improve the infrastructure of pipes, wells and tanks to ensure you have access to reliable, high-quality water now and in the future.

Owen Tank Project (Topanga)

- Replaced an aging tank with a new 500,000 gallon steel tank with an earthquake-resistant foundation. Also provides capacity for fire protection and emergency storage for the community
- Construction began in May 2023 and completed August 2024

Well Location Study (Antelope Valley)

- Install new wells and accompanying system improvements to increase water supply resiliency
- Initial study scheduled to be completed by early 2025



HOW LACWD PREPARES FOR WATER EMERGENCIES

A water emergency refers to situations that pose an immediate threat to public health, safety, or the integrity of the water supply system. This could include water main breaks, floods, earthquakes, wildfires, etc.

How does Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts prepare?

- Our team conducts regular system maintenance and participates in ongoing training, including emergency preparedness drills. Our infrastructure includes essential components such as:
 - Pump Stations
 - Water tanks
 - Backup Generators
 - Communication Systems

How does Los Angeles County communicate during an emergency?

- Robocall and text alerts
- E-mail blasts
- LACWD website
