California montane chaparral and oak woodlands.

Fire History

There have been many fires that have burned within the perimeter of the Tick Fire, but the latest significant fire was the Freeway Fire No. 2 in 1995. Other fires older than 1995 are not shown on the Tick Fire History Map.

Summary of Potential Postfire Debris Flow Impacts

The Tick Fire burned area is divided into 300 subareas and is located in Debris Production Area zones 8 and 9. The debris production volumes noted in the Postfire Debris Flow Hazards Map are those resulting from a moderate to severe storm event. Parts of Tick Canyon Road, Sunrose Place, Wistaria Valley Road, and Doug Road in the City of Santa Clarita may be inaccessible due to flooding and sediment deposits during storm events. Evacuations
